ZONING / CODE / GENERAL ENFORCEMENT

• Mr. Gormley signed the Town of Sherman's Asbestos Project Notification Fee Waiver Request & Certification, saving the Town a few thousand dollars.

DEPARTMENTAL REPORTS FROM CHIEF OPERATOR

- **SEWER** Kyle is registered for his last three classes, which will be done virtually.
- **WATER** the Village received a letter regarding a hole left at 110 Cornish Street during the water project, this hole was left temporarily open for the water department to access; the enforcement officer said the temporary fence the water department placed around the hole is appropriate until the water department is finished with their need for access.
- STREETS there are still a few incandescent light bulbs that need to be replaced by LED.
- **STORMWATER** Mayor Meeder reviewed the pamphlet which was sent out to all the Village residents with their last water and sewer bills.

GRANT APPLICATION UPDATES

Update on Consolidated Funding Application (CFA):

GIGP – **Main Street Stormwater Project** (EFC - Green Innovation Grant Program) was NOT awarded to the Village of Sherman; the Village is meeting with the EFC on January 24, 2022 to discuss the 2021 application and the recommendation for a 2022 application in July. There were four times the request than funding available in the recent round.

Update on other Grant Funding Applications (non-CFA):

EV Charging Stations – awaiting final execution by NYSOSC

Status of Outstanding Grant Applications (non-CFA):

RBDG – **Rural Business Development Grant** was awarded in 9/2021 in the amount of \$16,000. The total for the project is \$19,038, which includes the Village match of \$3,038. This project is in support of local businesses for signs off the Clymer-Sherman Road and 10 mobile signs and a trailer.

CAPITAL PROJECT UPDATES

COMPREHENSIVE PLAN

- **NYMS-TA Downtown Feasibility Study** Clinton Brown continues to meet with businesses on the building surveys and estimates and is hoping to present something in the next couple of months.
- CDBG-Community Planning Downtown Market Analysis

Alexandra and Tom from Camoin Associates met with the Steering Committee on Monday January 10th, at 6pm, to begin the Market Analysis for the Village of Sherman. They will help direct Camoin in prioritizing three locations to identify opportunities and potential redevelopment scenarios that include building rehabilitation OR new construction (with cost estimates & financial feasibility assessment). They'll prepare conceptual site plans attracting

viable projects for investors, developers, and banks. - Along with realtors, CCIDA and other interested parties.

SEWER

• The Pre-Construction Meeting was held with H&K Services, BECC Electric, and Allied Mechanical. Construction is planned to start in March or April.

WATER

• Work has slowed through the season, but still continues at the Hart Street site.

COMMITTEE UPDATES

• Edmunds Park Committee - The Edmunds Park Committee has received another \$15,000 donation from the Wake Family Charitable Foundation. The Village Board and committee members are very appreciative of this generous donation for the park that runs along the French Creek. The committee plans to meet at the end of this month to decide what their next steps will be. The Village plan to do the first step of the SEQRA for the park as soon as we receive the paperwork. This may require an additional meeting this month.

• Steering Committee – this was discussed under the CDBG Community Planning project.

MAYORAL ADDRESS

• **157 West Main Street** – The mayor expressed her heartfelt condolences to the Taylor family during this tragic time. She said a motion was on the table to discontinue any 2022 charges for utilities which would be voted on later in the meeting. This means we would remove their EDU so that they don't accumulate any more expenses at this time. The clerk would assist them in applying for the LIHWAP (Low Income Household Water Assistance Program) for their current outstanding balance.

• **NYCOM** – has signed a letter in an effort to increase AIM (Aid and Incentives for Municipalities) funding. Previously it was for \$5,277 per year, but they are pushing for an increase.

Proposed Action: Village of Sherman Electric Vehicle Charging Station Project

RESOLUTION DETERMINING THAT THE PROPOSED SHERMAN ELECTRIC VEHICLE CHARGING STATION PROJECT IS AN UNLISTED ACTION AND WILL NOT HAVE A SIGNIFICANT ADVERSE IMPACT ON THE ENVIRONMENT

WHEREAS, the Village of Sherman (Village) is proposing the Village of Sherman Electric Vehicle Charging Station Project (Project), located in the Village of Sherman, Chautauqua County, New York; and

WHEREAS, the Project has been classified as an "Unlisted Action" as defined by the State Environmental Quality Review Act; and

WHEREAS, the Village sent a letter and Part 1 of a Short Environmental Assessment Form (SEAF) to be sent to other potentially "Interested" and "Involved Agencies", indicating the Village's desire to serve as the "Lead Agency" and to complete a coordinated review of the Project; and

WHEREAS, responses from Interested and Involved Agencies were requested, and each of the potentially Interested and Involved Agencies has agreed to, or raised no objections to, the Village of Sherman Village Board serving as Lead Agency for the Project; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to the SEQRA Regulations, the Village of Sherman Village Board has considered the significance of the potential environmental impacts of the Project by (a) using the criteria specified in the SEQRA Regulations, and (b) examining the SEAF for the Project, including the facts and conclusions in Parts 1, 2 and 3 of the SEAF, together with other available supporting information, to identify the relevant areas of environmental concern:

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that, the Village of Sherman Village Board hereby establishes itself as Lead Agency for the Project; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that based upon an examination of the SEAF and other available supporting information, and considering both the magnitude and importance of each relevant area of environmental concern, and based further upon the Village's knowledge of the area surrounding the Project, the Village of Sherman Village Board makes the determination that the Project will not have a significant adverse environmental impact and that the Project will not require the preparation of a Draft Environmental Impact Statement; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that as a consequence of such findings and declaration, and in compliance with the requirements of SEQRA, the Village of Sherman Village Board, as Lead Agency, hereby directs the Village of Sherman Mayor to sign the SEAF Part 3 – Determination of Significance indicating that a Negative Declaration has been issued for the Project; this Resolution shall take effect immediately.

RES 2022-01-12.11: MONROE BALANCING TEST

Resolution Declaring the Village of Sherman exempt from the Town of Sherman's Solar Law under the County of Monroe Balancing of Interests Test

WHEREAS, the Village of Sherman ("Village") has contracted with Solar Liberty Energy Systems, Inc. ("Solar Liberty") to construct and install two (2) contiguous community solar facilities on Village owned land in Chautauqua County to benefit the community and the environment (the "Project"). Solar Liberty Sherman 1 (SL Array #1) will have an electric generating capacity of 6.45 MW-DC, while Solar Liberty Sherman 2 (SL Array #2) will have an electric generating capacity of 6.25 MW-DC. The combined facility will include Arrays #1 and #2 and associated electrical appurtenances on approximately 40.5 acres, a portion of which is within the Village's municipal boundaries; and

WHEREAS, State Accelerated Renewable Energy Growth and Community Benefit Act and New York sets forth the goal of 70% of renewable energy sources by 2030, increasing the demand for land used for solar energy generation; and

WHEREAS, the Project represents an efficient and affordable way for all New Yorkers to gain access to clean energy and meets renewable energy goals set forth by New York State; and

WHEREAS, the Project will provide Village and Town residents access to an efficient and affordable clean energy source and qualify them to save money on their utility bills; and

WHEREAS, on February 17, 2021, the Village declared itself lead agency in a coordinated review under the State Environmental Quality Review Act ("SEQRA") in relation to the environmental review of the Project; and

WHEREAS, no interested or involved agencies objected during the lead agency solicitation period; and

WHEREAS, based upon an examination of the Full Environmental Assessment Form and other available supporting information, and considering both the magnitude and importance of each relevant area of environmental concern, and based further upon the Village's knowledge of the area surrounding the Project, the Village of Sherman Village Board determined that the Project will not have a significant adverse environmental impact and that the Project will not require the preparation of a Draft Environmental Impact Statement; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Village of Sherman Local Law 1 of 2021 (the "Village Solar Law"), Village projects and activities are exempt from the Village's Zoning Code; and

WHEREAS, the portion of the Project located in the Town of Sherman is expressly permitted pursuant to Town of Sherman Local Law 3 of 2020 (the "Town Solar Law"), subject to the issuance of a Special Use Permit by the Town Board; and

WHEREAS, the Village has considered the balancing of interests test set forth by the New York State Court of Appeals case entitled *Matter of Monroe v City of Rochester* discussed in the attached Findings; and

WHEREAS, the purpose of the *County of Monroe* balancing test is to determine which governmental interest should prevail where there is a conflict between land use regulations of one political unit and the statutory authority of another unit to perform a designated public function; and

WHEREAS, the *County of Monroe* balancing test identifies nine (9) separate factors to be considered to determine whether a specific project qualifies for immunity from land use regulations; and

WHEREAS, in this case, the conflicting governmental interests are those of the Village and the Town; and

WHEREAS, for the reasons set forth in the attached findings, the Village finds that the Project, which is being developed for the community benefit, is exempt from the Town Solar Law.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that the Village Board of Trustees hereby adopts the attached findings, a copy of which is attached hereto and made a part hereof, and hereby declares the Village-sponsored Project is exempt from the Town Solar Law.
